





PROJECT UPDATES



Plenty Road/Everton Drive intersection

Construction of a new intersection providing access to the future regional sports precinct in Mernda is expected to finish in late 2025. The project includes a 100 metre extension of Everton Drive and a new signalised intersection with Plenty Road that will help to improve traffic flow around Mernda and provide a safe access point to the future sports precinct.

The State Government has contributed \$10 million from its Growth Areas Infrastructure Contribution fund towards transport infrastructure for the precinct.



Murnong Community Centre

Progress is being made on the Murnong Community Centre in Donnybrook, with the steel framework up and roof works nearing completion. Works on the internal partitions and car park are currently underway and the centre is due to open in early 2026. The centre will have a two-room kindergarten, maternal and child health services, mini-branch library, community hall and more.

The City of Whittlesea is delivering this centre with support from the Victorian Government through its Building Blocks Program, Growing Suburbs Fund, Living Libraries Infrastructure Program and Changing Places Program.

Regional Sports Precinct At it's March Council Meeting.

Council considered tenders for the construction of the main works for the regional sports precint in Mernda including four indoor sports courts, eight outdoor courts, and outdoor pavilion car park and landscaping.

The Federal Government has committed \$11.5 million towards construction of the indoor stadium and outdoor courts, while the State Government has committed \$10 million towards transport infrastructure and a further \$10 million for the indoor stadium.



Findon Road/Williamsons **Road intersection**

Works to install permanent traffic lights to improve safety and flow at the busy Findon Road/Williamsons Road intersection are progressing well.

Major drainage, kerb and channel and road works on the southern side of Findon Road have been completed and asphalt works are underway. The project, which is expected to be finished in the coming months, will make it easier for motorists to access important local destinations, such as Marymede Catholic College and Middle Gorge railway station.



Partridge Recreation Reserve. Lalor

The conversion of Partridge Recreation Reserve's grass pitch into a FIFA-accredited synthetic surface will give soccer players extra time to play and train. The upgrade, due to be completed in the coming weeks, will see usage double to about 40 hours a week in a win for competitive and recreational players.

In addition to the pitch upgrade, the project includes new lighting, fencing and pathway connections from Partridge Street to Monash Street.

The redevelopment is fully funded by Council.



Playground upgrades

Families will enjoy the results of exciting upgrades to parks across the municipality through our 2024-25 Renewal of Playgrounds program. Notable projects underway include a revamp of Foothills Park in South Morang, as well as upgrades to Hibiscus Park in Mill Park. Other recently upgraded parks include Wombat Corner Park in Mernda, Towerhill Park in Doreen, and Bushmans Park in South Morang.

The renewals of the Towerhill Park, Foothills Park and Bushmans Park playgrounds are supported by the Australian Government.

Aboriginal Gathering Place taking shape

The Aboriginal Gathering Place at Quarry Hills Parklands will create a welcoming, inclusive and culturally safe space for the region's First Peoples when it opens later this year.

That is the view of Whittlesea Aboriginal Gathering Place Advisory Group (WAGPAG) co-chair Karen Bryant, who has been a long-time advocate for the project.

Construction of the Aboriginal Gathering Place on Wurundjeri Country at the parklands started in July 2024 and is expected to be finished in mid-2025.

The project features a range of indoor and outdoor multi-purpose spaces, including large community event spaces, consulting suites, meeting spaces and quiet rooms.

Works on the concrete slab finished in December 2024 and the steel framework went up in January before attention turned to the roof, doors and windows.

A significant part of the parkland's redevelopment has been the installation of support infrastructure to the Aboriginal Gathering Place and Granite Hills Major Community Park.

Construction of an access road, car park and car park lighting, and installation of water, sewer and power services at the site are also progressing well.

"As a long-time advocate for the Aboriginal Gathering Place, seeing it finally come to life fills me with a deep sense of pride, accomplishment and emotion," Karen said.

"The Gathering Place coming out of the ground signifies more than just a physical structure being built, it embodies the cultural, social and spiritual aspirations of the Aboriginal people in this region."

Inside the Aboriginal Gathering Place visitors will experience murals, carvings and sculptures by Aboriginal artists representing Dreaming stories, while outside the landscape will feature native plants and bush foods.

Council is fully funding the facility's construction

Upgrade to provide boost for traders

Customers will soon enjoy greater comfort and convenience when visiting the **Alexander Avenue shopping** precinct in Thomastown.

Work to upgrade the popular retail precinct started in January and is expected to be finished in the coming weeks.

The project is delivering improved car parking, including two accessible parks and a new pedestrian crossing over Boronia Street at the intersection of Alexander Avenue.

New seats, picnic setting, bins, drinking fountain and garden beds for trees and vegetation will make the strip a more attractive place to stop and spend time.

A shared cycle and pedestrian path connecting to Nick Ascenzo Reserve will ensure the shopping strip is more easily accessed by people on foot and bikes.

This project is supported by a \$200,000 grant from the Victorian Government's Living Local Suburban Grant program and \$256,670 from the Road Safety Program 2023-2025.



Bridging the digital divide: A call for better connectivity

Many residents and businesses in the City of Whittlesea continue to struggle with poor mobile and internet connectivity, impacting safety, business and daily life.

The City of Whittlesea recently commissioned a study on mobile coverage across the municipality to ensure that we have current and accurate information to underpin our advocacy efforts for funding to improve our mobile services.

The study found that 10 per cent of locations have unusable network quality, emergency markers lack coverage and critical facilities suffer from inconsistent service.

As part of our ongoing advocacy, the City of Whittlesea collaborates with all levels of government to ensure essential services are available and to support improvements in community infrastructure.

We are calling on the Victorian and Federal governments to invest in eliminating mobile black spots, upgrading telecommunications sites, and ensuring emergency internet access at key community locations.

Julia's passion helps to change food waste to liquid gold

Julia's neighbourhood is full of beautiful olive trees. It's easy to spot the green olives dotted among the silvery leaves.

Each year, olive trees around our community grow full of fruit, but many olives go unpicked.

Julia collects olives and preserves them traditionally with care, but she knew more could be done when she saw the food waste on the ground. She reached out to Council and, thanks to her passion, the City of Whittlesea is joining CERES to bring Olives to Oil to life on Saturday 17 May.

Everyone in the community is invited to sign up and then bring their locally harvested olives for CERES to press into oil. Through the process you can learn about harvesting and pressing and also take home delicious local olive oil.


For Julia, this is about more than just olives – although hers are delicious. It's about reducing food waste and bringing her diverse community together.

Region on track for economic boos

Construction of the first stage of the highly anticipated Beveridge Intermodal Precinct is a step closer after the City of Whittlesea provided its support to the project and feedback on key planning controls.

Located in the north-west of the municipality, the Beveridge Intermodal Precinct will house a freight and logistics hub linked to the Melbourne-Albury-Sydney rail corridor.

The facility will allow for more freight to be moved by rail between Melbourne, Sydney, Brisbane and Perth, increasing productivity and reducing road congestion.

The economic benefits of the project are expected to be substantial, with the creation of new local jobs and an estimated \$2.5 billion to be added to the state's economy each year.

Council has long advocated for the facility and is working with National

Intermodal Corporation, which is delivering the project, to ensure a robust environment management framework to minimise any impacts during construction.

In February, Council endorsed a submission to the Minister for Planning that aimed to ensure environmental, cultural heritage and transport infrastructure issues were addressed.

The first stage of the project will see construction of a permanent rail connection to the rail freight corridor and an interim intermodal terminal.

Planning for subsequent stages will continue throughout 2025 in conjunction with the National Intermodal Corporation and Victorian Government.


