

/ew space opening soon The Aboriginal Gathering Place at bunjil nganga Parkland Quarry Hills will stand as a testament to years of community-led persistence and advocacy when it opens in the coming months.

Construction of the Aboriginal Gathering Place has entered its final stages and the centre will soon begin offering activities, programs and services to First Peoples and the wider community.

Located on Wurundjeri Country, the Aboriginal Gathering Place is fully funded by the City of Whittlesea and an important part of its long-held commitment to reconciliation and self-determination.

The centre features a range of multipurpose spaces, including large community events spaces, consulting suites and guiet rooms inside, and an amphitheatre and varning circle outside.

The building and landscape designs honour the First Peoples' enduring cultural and spiritual connection to its location within the buniil nganga Parkland.

Reaching this point would not have been possible without the advocacy of Elders, mob and the Whittlesea Reconciliation Group and Whittlesea Aboriginal Gathering Place Advisory Group over more than 20 years.

That spirit of community-based collaboration will continue after the centre opens, guiding the support offered to improve cultural, health, education and employment outcomes for First Peoples.

In late May, Council launched a two-month community consultation process calling for input from residents to inform the types of activities, programs and services available.

City of Whittlesea Mayor, Councillor Martin Taylor said establishing the Aboriginal Gathering Place was a

monumental achievement of which the community should be proud.

"The Aboriginal Gathering Place is the culmination of many, many years of hard work and I want to thank everyone who has been involved for their dedication."

"It is because of this advocacy that we will soon have a safe and inclusive space for our community to connect, share knowledge and promote reconciliation and healing," he said.

PROJECT UPDATES



Reid Street car park upgrade

The Reid Street car park in South Morang is set for an upgrade, with more parking, better lighting and added shade on the way.

The project will expand the car park to 85 spaces, replace existing lights with energy efficient LEDs and add new trees to provide natural shade. Works are due to be completed in the coming months.

This project follows the recent completion of the Gorge Road streetscape upgrade, further improving access and the look and feel of the area.



Darebin Creek Trail lighting

Late evening and early morning runs, walks and rides are now safer along the Darebin Creek Trail in Epping, between Cooper Street and Greenbrook Drive, thanks to new solar lighting. Twelve lights have been installed so far, with plans to add three more along the shared user path.

The improved lighting helps people clearly see the path ahead, making it easier to navigate and reducing the risk of trips and collisions. It also gives trail users a greater sense of safety and freedom to enjoy the area outside of daylight hours.



Sporting net upgrades

New and improved sporting nets are helping make local games safer and more enjoyable.

A ball-catching fence has been installed at RGC Cook Reserve in Thomastown and the cricket nets at Olivine Recreation Reserve in Donnybrook and AF Walker Reserve in Whittlesea have both been extended.

At Olivine, the roof of the cricket nets was extended by three metres and AF Walker saw a three-metre extension to its nets, both improving protection for players and spectators.

Playground ready to make a big Mash

Having provided feedback on draft plans to upgrade the Hill Top Splash Park and Playground, sisters Amelia and Sophie couldn't wait to road test the new features. And the verdict? It's fair to say it exceeded expectations.

The \$2.6 million upgrade of the park in Landano Way, Doreen was recently completed, delivering a modern, family-friendly precinct in tranquil surroundings.

One of the major attractions is a new 150 square metre splash pad containing jets, misters and other water-based features. However, visitors will have to wait patiently for the warmer weather to arrive later in the year before the water features become operational.

In the meantime, there is still plenty to keep children of all ages occupied, with the large new playground featuring an array of slides and swings, climbing nets, a trampoline, cubby and much more. The upgraded park has a focus on nature play, with a trail, balance logs, boulders and steppers installed under the park's established trees.

A new shelter with picnic tables ensures parents can sit in comfort and watch their children play, while a car park extension, public toilet and Changing Places facility for people with higher needs rounds out the additions.

Amelia and Sophie's mum Steph said while the park was already a favourite with her family, the upgrade would see them visit even more regularly.

"The girls have been really keen to see it finished because they took part in the [community consultation] and voted on some of the features."

"It's just so nice to have spaces like this where you can go as a family and get off your screens," she said.

The project was funded by the City of Whittlesea with support from the Australian Government through \$1.5 million from its Investing in Our Communities Program and the Victorian Government through \$500,000 from its Open Space for Everyone – Better Parks and Playgrounds Program.

Whittlesea Township Park upgrades

Whittlesea Township Park is now easier for people of all ages to enjoy thanks to some recently completed upgrades.

The works include a new 10-metre concrete bridge over the Plenty River, 620 metres of concrete-shared paths, improved lighting and signage and accessible routes for emergency vehicles and people walking, running, cycling, or using prams or mobility aids.

The Victorian Government, through its Growing Suburbs Fund, matched Council's \$500,000 contribution to the project.



Peter Hopper Lake

Works at Peter Hopper Lake are progressing well, with major components like the sedimentation pond, drainage works and island construction nearing completion.

Additional silt removal is expected to begin shortly, with the pump well to be finalised once this stage is complete.

The project is tracking well overall and is expected to be completed later in the year.

This activity is funded by the City of Whittlesea and the Australian Government's Urban Rivers and Catchments Program.



Hendersons Creek Wetland Park and Playground

Residents can now enjoy a brand new play and recreation space at Hendersons Creek Wetlands next to The Promenade in South Morang.

The upgrade includes a modern playground, fitness equipment, a sheltered seating area and natural play elements. The pathways, including the shared user path connection to The Lakes Boulevard and pedestrian crossing, are complete.

This project was funded by the Victorian Government via the Open Space for Everyone – Better Parks and Playgrounds Program.

Dog parks deliver a barking good time

The completion of two dog park projects in Lalor and Wollert has set tails wagging among the canine community.

Dog owners and their pooches are enjoying the benefits of a new off-leash park at Allumba Park in Wollert and an upgraded off-leash park at Whittlesea Public Gardens

Visitors to Allumba Park can take their pets off-lead in a fully fenced area with a quiet zone, shelters, drinking fountains, park furniture and garden beds.


The upgraded park at Whittlesea Public Gardens also features a fully fenced area containing a quiet zone, improved surfaces, shelters, drinking fountains, new furniture and landscaping.

The City of Whittlesea currently has 13 off-leash dog parks across the municipality, providing dogs and their owners a perfect place to stay active, have fun and connect with fellow pet lovers.

The Allumba Park project received \$500,000 and the Whittlesea Public Gardens project \$340,000 from the Victorian Government's Open Space for Everyone – New and Upgraded Dog Parks Program. The City of Whittlesea contributed \$80,000 to the Whittlesea Public Gardens dog park project.

Our waste taskforce in action

We Love Where We Live and we all agree that illegally dumped rubbish is unsafe, unfair and expensive for everyone to manage.

That's why we launched a dedicated waste taskforce earlier this year.

We're taking strong action, with a targeted response around hotspots and our much-loved streets, parks, roadsides and other open spaces.

What we're doing

Since our waste taskforce began in February, we've:

- Reduced dumped rubbish collection times for completed investigations to just two days
- Inspected more than 6,750 properties through targeted. unannounced compliance checks
- Issued 129 notices to offenders to clean up their waste
- Issued \$68,183 in extra fines for non-compliance with clean up notices.

With more than 200 reports of dumped rubbish each week, our coordinated approach includes investigation officers, enforcement teams and operational clean-up crews, as well as teams working on education.

Investigations can be complicated but with witnesses in the community, doorbell or security camera footage, Council's CCTV and other information from community reports we can often track the waste back to the offender.

At the same time, we're on the front foot supporting you to get your waste to the right place by:

- Launching an ongoing education campaign
- Distributing flyers about the two free hard rubbish collections each year in hotspot areas
- Updating our website to improve accessibility to waste information and services
- Promoting our range of free and discounted waste services to the community.

Don't was e your good intentions

David is one of many residents in the City of Whittlesea who has happily taken a minute to learn the right way to bin it.

Our kerbside compliance officers have been hitting the streets in recent months to help locals ensure their waste ends up in the right place.

Putting your item in the correct bin protects the environment, reduces costs and means less waste is sent to landfill as it can be recycled into new products and materials.

When things are put in the wrong bin, the whole bin can end up in landfill. Hazardous items, like batteries, can cause fires and damage collection trucks. The wrong thing in the wrong bin costs everyone.

Unfortunately, efforts to do the right thing sometimes go to waste. For example, we often see bagged recyclables in the recycling bin (yellow lid).

These items are treated as general rubbish and sent to landfill when they aren't loose.

David welcomed the opportunity to chat with one of our officers in Whittlesea.

On rare occasions when a bin can't be emptied due to incorrect items, our officers will help you book a one-off collection after the contaimination is removed.

Empowering young women to lead and make change

Confidence. Connection. Leadership. These are just some of the outcomes of the Young Women's Leadership Program, run by the City of Whittlesea.

This free, 10-week program is open to young women aged 14 to 20. It helps participants build confidence, develop leadership skills, and connect with others in a safe and supportive space.

The program includes workshops, group discussions and guest speakers from the local community. Topics include women in leadership, gender equality, mental health, healthy relationships and self-confidence. You will learn useful skills, share ideas and hear from inspiring women who are making a difference.

"The Young Women's Leadership Program gave me a safe space to reflect, share and learn. It opened up conversations we don't often get to have and gave me the confidence to use my voice and grow into a better version of myself."

Since 2019, 62 young women have participated, with many taking on leadership roles in City of Whittlesea programs like the Youth Council or community events.

In 2025, former participant Kaynat became City of Whittlesea Youth Mayor – a great example of what's possible.

"As Youth Mayor, I carry those lessons with me and I believe this is an experience every young woman should have," she said.

Mernda sports hub brings the game to players

The regional sports precinct in Mernda is poised to provide a welcome home-ground advantage to future generations of players.

Conveniently located off Plenty Road, the precinct will be a central hub for people from across the region to play the sports they love close to home.

The precinct's second stage is underway and will deliver an indoor stadium with multipurpose sports courts and outdoor netball courts with lighting.

There will also be a range of supporting infrastructure for players and staff, including changerooms, reception, outdoor pavilion, car park and landscaping.

We know many participants, including junior girls and boys, are currently having to travel outside the municipality to play popular sports like netball and basketball.

Whittlesea local and rising Melbourne Vixens star Tara Watson knows how difficult it can be to have to travel long distances simply to train and play.

"Having this just down the road for all the kids in the future will be amazing and I think it's a great, positive step for the future of netball." she said.

"I think the precinct will definitely help inspire young girls, and young boys as well, to play netball."

The Australian Government has committed \$11.5 million towards construction of the indoor stadium and outdoor courts, while the Victorian Government has committed \$10 million towards transport infrastructure and a further \$10 million for the indoor stadium.

A dose of Ginger helps students

Ginger the pony is proving to be a hit with students at Donnybrook Primary School as part of their new Equine Assisted Learning program.

With the support of a City of Whittlesea Community Grant, the new program is helping target students' social and emotional needs as they interact with Ginger.

Working with a skilled facilitator, students work on a range of skills including self-regulation, expressing feelings and needs, boundaries and healthy relationships.

School Principal Dave Williams said many of the students show calmer behaviour in the classrooms, are better able to solve problems and more able to express their thoughts and emotions.

"The program has benefited a wide range of students including a number of students who are neurodiverse, and many students from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds," he said.

"We're incredibly grateful to have received a Community Grant from the City of Whittlesea this year."

Budget to deliver for our community

Improvements to roads, parks and open space, community safety and support for young people, older adults and local businesses are just some of the key services and projects to be delivered as part of the City of Whittlesea's 2025-2026 Budget.

The Budget provides \$111 million to build, upgrade or expand key infrastructure across our city, including:

- The next stage of construction of the regional sports precinct in Mernda
- Completion of the Murnong Community Centre in Donnybrook
- Upgrade of Peter Hopper Lake
- Commence the upgrade of Huskisson Reserve multipurpose facility
- Delivery of local road restoration and resurfacing
- Ongoing road and playground upgrades across the municipality.

Extensive community consultation helped shape the Budget, with more than 1,100 community members sharing their views through online surveys, pop-up sessions, focus groups and formal submissions.

Better phone and internet for everyone

The City of Whittlesea is working hard to make phone and internet services better for all residents.

Many people who live, work or play in our local area have problems with mobile coverage and internet that drops out. Some schools, health centres and busy roads even have no service at all.

This makes it hard to study, work, run a business, or call for help in an emergency.

That's why we're asking the State and Federal governments and phone companies to:

- Fix black spots where there is no coverage
- Improve service in homes, businesses and along major roads
