Investigation leads to clean-up and fine

\$9,880

Before

A large pile of renovation waste was discovered earlier this year during a routine patrol of a known litter hotspot – Vearings Road, Epping. But where did the illegally dumped rubbish come from? And who put it there?

That day, we investigated and identified key pieces of information within the illegally dumped rubbish – two sets of signage from separate businesses. These were two critical leads in the investigation that kicked off a line of enquiries.

We traced the signage to two major shopping centres in Melbourne and a skip company located in Campbellfield, which led to the identification of a private waste company, believed to be responsible for illegally dumping the rubbish.

When we issued a notice to the alleged offender, the waste was removed and returned to the company's sorting facility in Campbellfield. The street was back to what we love - clean, beautiful and safe.

A fine of \$9,880 is set to be issued.

We often work closely with the **Environmental Protection Authority** (EPA) and in this instance, the EPA were investigating a similar, related offence

involving the same company. By working together, we were able to achieve better enforcement outcomes and help catch and fine repeat offenders.

Your reports, including CCTV or licence plate information, can be incredibly useful to support our investigations. You can provide these to us via our website or by calling us.

We continue regular patrols, surveillance and enforcement, but we also support our residents with education and options to get rid of unwanted items and waste – see pages 15 and 16 for more information on what's available to help you get rid of your waste properly.

PROJECT UPDATES



Regional sports precinct

Construction of the next stage of the regional sports precinct at Mernda will soon begin. The works will deliver four multipurpose indoor courts and eight outdoor netball courts. It also includes a reception, kiosk, bathrooms, meeting rooms, first aid room, storage areas, outdoor pavilion, landscaping, footpaths and car parks.

The Australian Government has committed \$11.5 million towards construction of the indoor stadium and outdoor courts, while the Victorian Government has committed \$10 million towards transport infrastructure and a further \$10 million for the indoor stadium.



Alexander Avenue

Visitors to the shopping strip along Alexander Avenue in Thomastown are enjoying the benefits of major upgrades. New seats, bins, drinking fountain, garden beds, trees and concrete paths have made the site a more pleasant place to shop and spend time. Improvements to car parking make visiting the precinct safer and a new 2.5m wide footpath connects the north and south sides of Nick Ascenzo Reserve.

This project is supported by a \$200,000 grant from the Victorian Government's Living Local Suburban Grant program and \$256,670 from the Road Safety Program 2023-2025.



Aboriginal Gathering Place

Work on the Aboriginal Gathering Place at bunjil nganga (Quarry Hills) Parkland has entered the final stages ahead of its opening in the coming months. Construction began in July 2024 and its design honours the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung People's connection to Country.

The Gathering Place features spectacular views and connections to 6.5km of walking trails, as well as a range of indoor and outdoor multi-purpose spaces. The centre will help foster a sense of belonging through activities, programs and services that strengthen culture and enhance wellbeing.



Gorge Road streetscape

The Gorge Road shopping precinct in South Morang is a safer and more appealing place to visit after a series of upgrades. Features include an expanded outdoor dining area with seating, tables, bins, bike racks and trees, while safety has been improved with parallel parking in front of the shops, a raised pedestrian crossing and new streetlights.

Attention will now turn to expanding and asphalting the Reid Street car park and adding more lights and trees.

This project was funded by the City of Whittlesea and the Victorian Government via a grant from its Growing Suburbs Fund.



Granite Hills Major Community Park

A world of adventure awaits when the Granite Hills Major Community Park in South Morang opens soon.

The park features a playground with giant slides, flying fox, lawn maze, swings, boardwalk, walking trails and nature and water play, as well as barbecues, picnic settings and public toilets. The attraction is designed to maximise the area's natural beauty.

The City of Whittlesea is contributing \$5.5 million towards the project, with the Victorian Government providing \$2.5 million from its Growing Suburbs Fund.

Plenty Road-Everton Drive intersection

Construction of the new traffic light-controlled Plenty Road-Everton Drive intersection at Mernda is well advanced. The intersection will provide motorists and pedestrians with a safe and convenient way to access the regional sports precinct and Mernda Village. Once work is complete, the traffic lights and street lights will be connected and the intersection will open.

The Victorian Government has contributed \$10 million from its Growth Areas Infrastructure Contribution fund towards transport infrastructure for the precinct.

Partridge Recreation Reserve pitch Perfect

Come rain, hail or shine, the new soccer pitch at Partridge Recreation Reserve in Lalor will ensure players can take to the park and play thanks to a \$2.3 million project to convert a grass soccer field into a FIFA-accredited synthetic pitch.

The new pitch, which is complemented by the installation of energy-efficient LED lighting, has seen usage double from 20 hours a week to more than 40 hours a week. The synthetic pitch's ability to allow greater playing time than a grass pitch is good news for tenant Mill Park Soccer Club and its 300-plus members.

It also means that residents, community groups and schools will have greater opportunities to use the facilities.

City of Whittlesea Mayor, Councillor Martin Taylor said the new pitch was a welcome addition to the municipality's sporting facility landscape.

"Council is committed to providing the community with the sporting facilities that residents need and removing barriers to participation, particularly for women and girls."

"Our municipality has one of the highest soccer participation rates in the state and this pitch will help ensure even more people can join in the fun," he said.

The upgrade, which was fully funded by the City of Whittlesea, also includes new fencing and pathway connections from Partridge Street to Monash Street.

Sustainability was a focus of the project, with an estimated 145 tonnes of plastic and rubber waste diverted from landfill and used to create the pitch's 25mm thick underlay.

Another notable feature was the use of repurposed olive pith – a waste product from the olive oil industry – as an organic infill material, which will reduce the pitch's surface temperature in the warmer months.

Construction begins on new centre

Work is continuing on the \$16.2 million West Wollert Community Centre, which will provide a welcoming space for people of all ages and abilities to access vital services.

Construction of the centre, located on the corner of Jardin Road and Meadow Lane, began in April 2025 and is expected to be finished in early 2027.

The centre will have a three-room kindergarten creating 198 new places and two Maternal and Child Health Services consulting suites. There will be a number of spaces for groups including a community hall, kitchen, lounge, activity room and garden.

Residents will also be able to enjoy use of a mini-branch library providing access to Yarra Plenty Regional Library's extensive collection of books, magazines and digital materials.

The centre will focus on accessibility to ensure all residents can enjoy its facilities, including provision of a Changing Places facility for people with high care needs.

Council is investing \$7.7 million towards the project, with the Victorian Government contributing \$6.75 million from its Building Blocks Fund and \$1.5 million from its Growing Suburbs Fund. Melbourne Water is also contributing \$168,663 to deliver paving within the car park.

Thomastown local Iain knows the difference trees make. He's watched the trees in his street grow into a shady, green canopy.

"The street trees soften the street and give it a much more natural feel which looks great. They also provide shade during summer, keeping our street cooler which is welcome when taking the dog for a walk," said lain.

This winter, we're growing more trees in streets around the City of Whittlesea just like Iain's.

As part of our annual Street Tree Renewal Program, we have planted 500 new trees in residential streets and more than 1,000 along main roads and popular streetscapes.

This includes trees with beautiful colours, like jacarandas and kurrajongs, and dwarf apple gums, which are loved by native wildlife.

"There are younger trees that have been planted in the streets around ours and I look forward to seeing them grow over the coming years. They will make Thomastown an even better place to live."

Street trees do more than look good. We carefully select the right tree for the right place, making sure we plant a tree that thrives in that spot and works best for the community and the environment. While some trees do drop their leaves, the overall benefits they provide far outweigh the effort it may take to manage the fallen leaves.

You can help by taking care when mowing around street trees and park in allocated spaces only to avoid damaging the roots or compressing the soil.

While lain's favourite tree lined street is, luckily, the one he lives in, he's excited about the future of his neighbourhood.

Our free social events include monthly morning teas and breakfasts and are a great way to meet new people and enjoy a friendly chat.


Eligible members can also access free or subsidised exercise physiology services.

Don't park in front of these - fire trucks need access in emergencies.




Shows the current fire danger level for today and reminds you to have a fire plan.

Noise restrictions and complaints

Noise is a part of our everyday environment, whether it be barking dogs, cars, music, machines, power tools or people going about their daily activities. If you're dealing with loud sounds disturbing your peace, here's how to address the problem.

What to do first

If it's safe and appropriate, we encourage you to talk to the person or business making the noise. They might not even realise that it's causing a disturbance and could fix it right away. Sometimes, a simple conversation can solve the issue.

Who to contact

Noise in Victoria is regulated by the **Environment Protection Authority** (EPA), local councils like the City of Whittlesea and Victoria Police. But many people don't know exactly who to contact for specific types of noise.

If you're unsure, don't worry! The City of Whittlesea can help guide you, and if we can't handle the issue, we will refer you to the right authority.
