Centre to bring sense of belonging to community

Anticipation is building among Donnybrook residents as construction of the Murnong Community Centre nears completion. The \$11.4 million facility, located at 183 Olivine Boulevard, will cater to the rapidly growing suburb.

The multipurpose centre will offer lots of community services at low or no cost, including a mini-branch library giving residents access to Yarra Plenty Regional Library's extensive catalogue, as well as free Wi-Fi and flexible spaces to work, study, connect and relax.

Community groups and residents will be able to hold events or programs in either a large community hall or one of the multipurpose activity rooms.

The centre will also have a Changing Places facility to support people with high care needs, and an accessible public toilet available seven days a week.

Two kindergarten rooms will help meet the need for three- and four-year-old kinder, while Maternal and Child Health Services will be delivered from two consultation suites.

Local resident Nimi has lived in Donnybrook for two-and-a-half years with her husband Raj, son Dasham, daughter-in-law Sonia and grandchildren Anhad and Abeer.

She said her multi-generational family was looking forward to the sense of belonging and connection the centre would provide the community.

"There is a lot of expectation among people I talk to because we are looking for those spaces and that sense of belonging," she said.

"It will mean so much to have a place that is ours where we can run small events and workshops and enjoy that connectivity."

Construction of the Murnong Community Centre is expected to finish by the end of the year and will open in early 2026.

Council has contributed \$4 million towards the centre, with the remainder funded by Victorian Government grants.

These include \$4.5 million from the Building Blocks Capital Grants Program, \$2 million from the Growing Suburbs Fund, \$709,500 from the Living Libraries Infrastructure Program and \$180,000 from the Changing Places Program.

PROJECT UPDATES



Reid Street car park upgrade

The Reid Street car park upgrade, behind the Gorge Road shops in South Morang is nearing completion, bringing more accessible parking for the local community. The project includes expanding the car park, installing new lighting and improving pedestrian access. Additional works include new drainage, entry and exit points, landscaping, a loading zone and clear signage and line marking. These improvements will make it easier and safer for people visiting nearby community facilities and services.



Hillsview Recreation Reserve upgrade

Recent lighting and surface upgrades at Hillsview Recreation Reserve in Bundoora are delivering brighter nights and better play for the local community. New energy-efficient lighting is delivering improved visibility and supporting more evening use. The synthetic soccer pitch has also been upgraded, providing a more durable, consistent and high-quality surface for players of all ages and abilities. These improvements make the reserve more accessible and enjoyable for everyone who uses it.

The lighting upgrade was fully funded by Council, while the pitch replacement was jointly funded by Council and the Victorian Government, which contributed \$500,000.



Foothills Park upgrade

The upgraded play space at Foothills Park in Epping is creating a more welcoming and accessible place for families to enjoy. New equipment includes slides, a swing and a rocker, along with timber seats and updated picnic settings. The existing barbecue and shelter have also been refurbished, providing more comfortable spots to gather and relax. A new concrete path and gravel paths now make it easier to move around the park. These upgrades enhance the park's usability for people of all ages and abilities.



Hibiscus Park upgrade

Hibiscus Park in Bundoora has been upgraded. A new concrete path links the north and southeast corners, improving access across the park. A multi-use court has been added for basketball, netball and four corners, along with a nature play area and new trees to boost shade and greenery. The upgraded playground includes slides, swings, spring rockers, a see-saw and a retained shade sail for toddlers. A new shelter area with a barbecue, picnic setting, drinking fountain and bin completes the space.



French St Hall Neighbourhood House

French Street Hall Neighbourhood House in Lalor has a fresh new look, with upgrades making it more welcoming and inclusive for everyone. The kitchen is now fully accessible and Disability Discrimination Act-compliant, making it easier to prepare meals for programs and events. A new hallway kitchenette gives visitors convenient access to tea and coffee, and the refurbished accessible toilet now includes a nappy change table and shower, making the venue more family-friendly.

The Neighbourhood House runs social groups, adult learning, and a weekly community lunch and food relief with St Vincent de Paul, providing a comfortable, accessible space for locals to connect and learn.



West Wollert Community Centre

Construction of the West Wollert Community Centre is progressing well, with wall and roof framing now underway following installation of services in the ground. Set to open in late 2026, the centre will offer kindergarten rooms, Maternal and Child Health Services consulting spaces, a mini-branch library, community hall, kitchen, meeting rooms, gardens and outdoor areas.

Sustainability features include solar panels, rainwater harvesting and permeable paving.

The \$16.138 million project is jointly funded, with the City of Whittlesea contributing \$7,719,447, the Victorian Government \$8,250,000, and Melbourne Water \$168,663.

Intersection to drive better connections

The new signalised intersection at Plenty Road and Everton Drive in Mernda will deliver safer and smoother connections for drivers, cyclists and pedestrians.

The project extended Everton Drive east to meet Plenty Road, easing congestion and improving access to local homes, schools, shops and community facilities.

It also provides direct access to the future regional sports precinct planned for the area and improves links to surrounding roads and shared paths.

The upgrade includes new traffic lights, pedestrian crossings and cycling infrastructure to improve safety and efficiency for all road users, and responds to the needs of Mernda's growing community, making everyday trips safer and faster.

The Victorian Government contributed \$5 million from its 2023 Growth Areas Infrastructure Contribution Fund, with Council delivering the works in partnership with the State Government.

Clear waters ahead

Living within walking distance of Peter Hopper Lake means that Leah and her daughter Zoe have been frequent visitors over the years.

They have seen the lake at its best, but too often at its worst, with long-standing water quality issues resulting in regular algae blooms.

As Council's project to revitalise the lake enters its final phases, the duo is looking forward to the lake returning to good health again.

"The lake is really a highlight of the local area when it's healthy – it's absolutely gorgeous. We're excited to go for walks and see the birds and have picnics."

"There's not too many places you can go as a family and not spend money, so we're really looking forward to it reopening," said Leah, who is a member of the Friends of Peter Hopper Lake group.

Council's expert engineers and environmental scientists have worked with specialist consultants and are actioning a plan to improve water quality and end the cycle of algae blooms.

Yarning Circle offers space to connect

The City of Whittlesea's weekly Yarning Circle is a welcoming space for First Peoples community members to come together, talk and connect in a culturally safe environment.

The Circle is held every Thursday morning at the Boori MCH Centre in Epping and will be one of the regular programs offered at the Aboriginal Gathering Place once it opens. It's a place to share stories, build relationships and strengthen community over a cuppa.

Yarning Circles are a long-standing tradition in many First Nations cultures. They centre on respectful listening, open conversation and connection through shared experience. The practice supports understanding, belonging and community-led healing.

For Karen, a proud Palawa woman, it's about connection and togetherness. A space to feel supported and heard.

Brooklyn, a proud Gamilaraay woman, says it's a chance to connect with other mums through culture.

"We do weaving, bracelet and jewellery making, use clap sticks with the children and talk about upcoming events like NAIDOC."

Each week, the conversation flows naturally, guided by the people in the room. There's no set agenda. Just a genuine chance to yarn, listen and be part of something meaningful.

Karen encourages anyone who hasn't been before to come along, especially families. She says it's a welcoming space for men too.

All First People community members are welcome to attend.

Programs for gathering space

With the Aboriginal Gathering Place at bunjil nganga Parkland Quarry Hills nearing completion, focus has now shifted to the programs that will run once it opens.

The City of Whittlesea recently concluded a two-month consultation period in which residents provided their input into the types of programs they would like to see held at the Aboriginal Gathering Place.

Responses included programs, activities and services that:

- improve the health and wellbeing of First Nations communities
- share knowledge and empower people through social activities
- foster reconciliation, health and healing by improving access, equity and opportunity.

Council has conducted a number of programs this year, including Healthy Households, Employment Pathways, Thriving Together and Yarning Circle, to gauge interest in continuing these when the gathering place opens.

Opportunities for partnerships with education providers, registered training organisations, Aboriginal Community and Health Organisations are also being explored. Programs will be run out of the Aboriginal Gathering Place's range of indoor and outdoor multipurpose spaces, including large community events spaces, consulting suites and meeting rooms.

The Aboriginal Gathering Place, which is fully funded by Council, is expected to open to the public in the months ahead.

Piecing the *waste* puzzle together

We Love Where We Live and we all care about keeping our streets clean and safe. That's why we are dedicated to investigating and taking action on illegally dumped rubbish.

We investigate:

- pre-loved household items dumped on kerbs and in parks
- renovation and building materials dumped in public spaces
- private waste companies dumping household or commercial waste
- donations left outside charity shops and bins that become waste.

Our team conducts regular patrols, surveillance, and enforcement, while also supporting residents with education, services, and advice on reducing waste and how to dispose of unwanted household items.

Earlier this year, we investigated a case of illegal dumping in Wollert, with three incidents occurring across Sturgeon Place, Bindts Road and Farmer Way. Community reports and CCTV helped us link all three to the same vehicle, but the licence plate wasn't clear.

On the third occasion, everything changed when a local resident captured a clear photo and reported it to the



Recycle your e-waste for free

Got a broken lamp, hair dryer, or other small household electrical items? E-waste, including unwanted or broken items with a plug, battery, or cord must not be placed in your household rubbish.

These items, like toasters, computers, and TVs, contain harmful materials that can pollute the environment. Recycling them helps protect the planet and recover valuable materials.

You can drop off your e-waste for free during opening hours to:

Lalor plugs in to fast EV charging

Electric vehicle (EV) drivers in the City of Whittlesea can now charge up quickly and conveniently in the heart of Lalor, thanks to a new fast charging station installed at 300 Station Street.

The charger can add up to 120 kilometres of range in just 15 minutes, making it ideal for quick top-ups while shopping, working, or visiting nearby services. It's a boost for local EV users and another step towards a cleaner, greener municipality.

Fast, accessible charging helps reduce range anxiety and encourages more people to switch to electric vehicles, which means cleaner air and lower carbon emissions for the whole community.

Local resident Bandu says the new station has already changed his routine.

"Before, I had to plan my day around charging stops further away," he said.

"I can quickly top up right here in Lalor while I do my shopping. It saves me so much time and makes owning an EV even more convenient."

The installation supports Council's commitment to sustainable transport and targets set out in our Climate Change Plan and Sustainable Environment Strategy.

It also adds to a growing network of chargers across the municipality, with more locations under consideration in Bundoora and at community facilities.

Free care for furry freeloaders

Have you recently encountered a stray cat roaming the streets, and wondered how you can help them find their forever home?

The City of Whittlesea, with support from Animal Welfare Victoria, offers a free desexing, microchipping and one year of registration to support residents who care for cats that aren't officially theirs, but rely on them for food, shelter and safety.

Local resident Elizabeth and her family recently took up this offer after coming across a kitten at her local park.

"She was at a park near our street, and we decided to put out some food. She ended up coming to my house and walked through the gate and explored the backyard," said Elizabeth.

"She had no collar, nothing. That's when we started to worry that she was a stray."

"We heard that Council could assist in desexing stray cats and then we could adopt her. I was so happy to do it.

Now she's best friends with our other cat. Seeing her become part of the family has been beautiful."

Know your weather risks and prepare ahead

While the weather might still be cool, it's a good time to start preparing for the upcoming summer season.

Below are some handy things to keep in mind:

✓ Emergency preparedness

- **Have a plan ready**
Know what to do if there is a fire near you. Be aware of risks near nature reserves. Never drive towards smoke or fire, and keep roads clear for emergency services.
- **Home emergency checklist**
Have an emergency kit with essentials like a home emergency plan, first aid kit, torch, batteries, radio, phone chargers, important documents, medications, water, food and pet items.

✓ Be aware of our prescribed burning program

Council and the Wurundjeri Narrap Rangers undertake planned burns to reduce fire risk. We publish the dates and locations for planned burns on our website and social media.

Stage is set for freight hub

Delivery of the first stage of the transformative Beveridge Intermodal Precinct is on track after the approval of new planning controls in August.

The decision means that works commencing on Stage 1A of the project, which involves building a permanent rail connection to the freight corridor and an interim intermodal terminal, are a significant step closer.

The Beveridge Intermodal Precinct is located in the municipality's north-west and will be a freight and logistics hub adjoining the Melbourne-Albury-Sydney rail corridor.

The precinct is expected to contribute an estimated \$2.5 billion annually to the state's economy and deliver increased employment opportunities to the region.

The interim terminal, to be delivered by the Australian Government-owned National Intermodal Corporation, will be capable of handling up to two 1,800-metre interstate freight trains a day.

Council has long supported the precinct in recognition of its potential to support a growing population through valuable new jobs.

Council had made a submission to the Minister for Planning, who is responsible for the project, on the planning proposal, supporting the project however recommending that the planning controls be strengthened to manage traffic and environmental impacts.


